An Analysis on the Proposal and Bid submitted to the
Joint Committee on the Public Education of the
Proposed Guam Constitution

J. Q. FANIHI PRODUCTIONS

On March 16, 1979, the J.Q. Fanihi Productions submitted a proposal and bid on the public education of the proposed Guam Constitution. The submitted proposal and bid, however, was not reviewed until March 21, 1979. The J.Q. Fanihi Productions is a duly licensed advertising production firm in the Territory of Guam. The firm proposed a sum of \$61,468.00 for the entire educational program.

The proposal presented a two phase public education program. The first phase include the translation of the proposed constitution into the Chamorro Language and the preparing, writing, and printing of an educational package. The package includes the following:

1. An explanation of P.L. 940584 regulating the limits of the Guam Constitutional Convention;
2. An explanation of the nature and function of a constitution;
3. A review of the difference between political status and a constitutional convention;
4. A review of the Organic Act and section of the Act which would be repealed;
5. A systematic analysis of each article, section, and subsection of the proposed Constitution compared to the Organic Act;
6. An abstraction and analysis of review of the proposed Guam Constitution as conducted by the U.S. Congress.

The package is to be completed by April 28, 1979, and to be used for public distribution.

The second phase involved the creation of a public awareness program through extensive use of the advertising media from May 1st to June 1st and the

creation of a Speaker's Bureau to coordinate the presentation of discussion of the proposed constitution. Twenty-two village meeting will be organized from May 17 to June 2nd. The distribution of the proposed constitution and educational materials will be facilitated through a "door to door" delivery by 30 students for two days.

The resource personnel principally includes Mr. Jerry Roberts, Director of J.Q. Fanihi Productions, and Dr. Benjamin F. Bast, Researcher, writer, editor and Public Relations Officer of J.Q. Fanihi Productions. In addition, a specialist in the Chamorro Language would be recruited as well as University of Guam staff and other resource personnel. The administrative staff includes a full-time legal secretary and a part-time clerical staff.

Upon a comprehensive review of the proposal, the following considerations are posed:

1. The proposal infers but lacks a concrete educational methodology in which the program is to be expressed in a manner which the general public understand. This violates a specification in the public bid announcement;
2. The proposal plans to conduct 22 village meetings at \$200 per meeting from May 14 to June 2nd, however June 2nd has to be excluded because of Election Day. The operative working days, excluding Sunday, is about 14 working days. This would mean that two teams for conducting village meetings have to be established. The proposal establishes only one team;
3. As proposed, the distribution of educational material would be by "door to door" delivery by 30 students for two days at a cost of \$1,440.00. Assuming that the Island has 8,750 households, and that 30 students will distribute these materials for two days (18 hours), each student will have to visit 291 households and spend 3 minutes per household. This dissemination strategy appears to be tediously, if not physically impossible;

4. The proposal indicated that the principal researcher, writer and editor is Dr. Benjamin Bast who is currently a professor at the University of Guam and it further indicated the possibility of recruiting other University employees. The anticipation and projection of employing University staff may be too presumptive. The University has established a policy regulating the employment of its faculty unless approved by the Board of Regents;

5. The Director of J.Q. Fanihi, Mr. Jerry Roberts, better known as J.Q. Fanihi is notoriously known for his comical image. Furthermore, the news media has implicitly aggravated and disparaged the Fanihi proposal.

6. The proposal establishes a speaker's bureau as solicited by the bid announcement. However, the proposed speaker's bureau is vague as to structure, organization, representation and identification. In addition, there is no existing letter of commitment regarding possible or potential speakers.

In sum, the proposal submitted by the J.Q. Fanihi Productions: lacks an educational methodology; the dissemination strategy is quite vague, if not unaccomplishable; the possible recruitment of staff may be unattainable; the existing comical image of J.Q. Fanihi; and the negative and presumptive opinion expressed by the media.

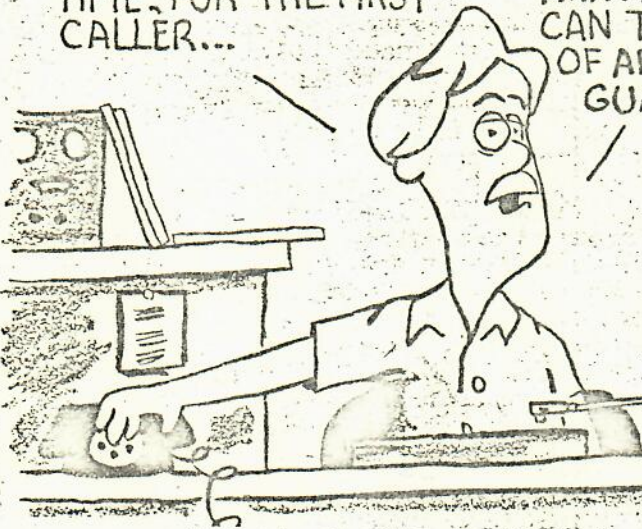

INVITATION TO BID

The Committee on Education and the Committee on Territorial-Federal Affairs announce an invitation to submit a proposal and bid on the public education of the proposed Guam Constitution.

The following considerations should be included, but not limited to the educational package:

1. The program be expressed in a manner which the general public understand;
2. Explanation of the federal legislation P.L. 94-58, regulating the limits of the Guam Constitution Convention;
3. Explanation of the nature and function of a constitution;
4. Explanation of the difference between political status and a constitutional convention;
5. Identification of the components in the Organic Act that will be repealed as a result;
6. Explanation and identification of each article, section and subsection of the proposed constitution compared to the Organic Act;
7. Abstraction of the analysis conducted by the U.S. Congress on the proposed constitution;
8. Creation of a speaker's bureau;
9. Formulation of a calendar of scheduled events on the educational program.
10. Translation of the proposed constitution into the Chamorro language;
11. Printing cost for the applicable items mentioned above;
12. Procedures for the public dissemination and education program.

An Analysis on the Proposal and Bid Submitted to the
Joint Committee on the Public Education of the
Proposed Guam Constitution

MICRONESIAN PRODUCTIONS INC.

On March 21, 1979, the Micronesian Productions Inc. submitted a proposal and bid on the public education of the proposed Guam Constitution. The submitted proposal and bid was reviewed on that date. The proposal indicated that Ms. Mary Lyon is the President and a bid of \$70,000 is included.

The following is a synopsis of the proposal. They are:

1. Translation of the proposed constitution;
2. Explanation of P.L. 94-854;
3. Explanation of the function of a constitution;
4. Explanation of the difference between political status and a constitution;
5. Cost of printing and publication;
6. Distribution of material to all registered voter by mail;
7. Creation of speaker's bureau which include 20 speakers;
8. Public meeting by panels to interested clubs, and organization upon request;
9. Village meetings by panels at least four (4) times for each village;
10. Panel appearance in the larger villages such as Dededo, Tamuning, Agat, and Barrigada, varying from 8 to 16 appearances;
11. Radio and television spots and shows.

Upon a comprehensive review of the proposal, the following considerations are posed:

1. The proposal infers but lacks a concrete educational methodology in which the program is to be expressed in a manner which the general public understands. This violates a specification in the public bid announcement;

2. The proposal lacks the analysis conducted by the U.S. Congress on the proposed constitution. This violates a specification in the public bid announcement;

3. The proposal lacks a formulation of a calendar of scheduled events on the educational program which violates a specification in the public announcement;

4. The proposal establishes a speaker's bureau, however, there is no commitment or identification of possible speakers.

In sum, the proposal violates a number of specifications established by the bid announcement and lacks a concrete educational methodology.



INCIDENT REPORT

At approximately 3:45 p.m., Thursday, March 29, 1979, I received a call from Dave Ecret, news director at KUAM, inquiring about the results of the joint committee meeting which was held at 1:30 p.m. today to discuss the educational program proposals for the Guam Constitution. He said that bumper stickers were being handed out by Senator Jim Underwood's office and that he wanted to know if there was a connection between the committees' decision and the dissemination of bumper stickers. I informed Dave that Senator Aguon had not yet apprised me of the results, but that as soon as she comes back to the office, I would find out and call him back as soon as possible.

At about 4:00 p.m., same date, Senator Aguon returned, whereupon I informed her of Dave's query. She in turn, gave me the decision written by the legal counsel (at the committees' instruction) to read to Mr. Ecret. I then phoned KUAM.


Mr. Jerry Roberts, known as "J.Q. Fanihi", answered the phone and I asked if I may speak with Dave Ecret. He asked if I was calling for Senator Aguon and I replied that I was. He told me that Dave was not in but that he would relay the information to him. OBSERVATION: It should be noted that when I relayed the information to Mr. Roberts, it was done so on the premise that such information was for news purposes and nothing else. The fact that Mr. Roberts had a personal interest in the nature of the information was mere coincidence.

It was at this point that Mr. Roberts requested that he speak with Senator Aguon himself to find out just why the committees found the proposals "inadequate". He said the committees should have given bidders the "courtesy" of informing them of their rejection before

any notification is given to the media. I told Mr. Roberts that the committees' legal counsel is in the process of preparing notification papers to those firms which submitted proposals. Mr. Roberts went at length, to explain the capability of his firm to conduct the educational program within the limited time available. He spoke of Dr. Ben Bast of the University of Guam and how he assisted in the drafting of the proposed Constitution. He said that other than the fact that his firm is "most equipped" to do the job, it is a project which in the end, will net him very little, if any, profit. He said he is willing however to do the job not only because of his firm's capability but because he has been a resident of Guam for the past eight years and since Guam is now his home, he would like to contribute what he can as a member of the community.

Mr. Roberts continued saying that it appears there is a group in the Legislature which is "upset" because the University of Guam did not submit a proposal and that some senators are attempting to "shelf" the proposals in hopes of delaying the referendum. He said he learned of these attempts from someone in the Legislature. "There's a leak in the Legislature," he said.

He then said that he would be leaving KUAM in about 15 to 20 minutes and that if Senator Aguon (who at this time, had already left the office for her class at the university) did not call him back within that time span, she will not be able to contact him until 6:00 a.m. tomorrow, and that it will be too late by then because he will have already decided what to say on his radio show. He did say that Senator Aguon will be surprised to hear what he has to say over the air and that it will not be very "pleasant".

Dear Mr. Torres:

I want to transmit to you five-hundred (500) copies of the Official Proceedings of the Guam Constitutional Convention. According to Public Law 14-84, "the Guam Legislature shall take custody of the publications and shall arrange in appropriate manner for its distribution and release." In addition, the act provides copies free of charge to the territorial archives and other government agencies. You are also required to sell copies of the publication to private citizens and non-governmental agencies.


I request that copies be released to the following governmental agencies: the 32 delegates to the Convention, 19 Senators (Sens. Underwood and Crisostomo were delegates), 1 to Rep. A. B. Won Pat, 1 copy to former Governor Bordallo, 1 to former Lt. Gov. Sablan, a copy to Gov. Paul Calvo, 1 copy to Lt. Gov. Joseph Ada, 7 copies to the judges, including the District Court judge, 3 copies to M.A.R.C.-UOG, 3 copies to Flores Library, and 1 copy to the Guam Museum for a total of 70 copies. The last three mentioned conform to the rules of the convention. Copies should go to Commissioners and Assistants.

Based on the total price of the publication which was \$5,761.71 and allowing total sales of 400 copies, the sale price for each copy would be \$14.42. For outside orders, you would want to add shipping and handling cost. Regarding this matter, there is a total of \$507.71 (receipts enclosed) in additional cost incurred paid in cash by Joe Dizon. Such costs were incurred on the publication after the account of the Convention was closed. Please arrange future re-imburements to him.
