DeSoto closed-door jury deliberations to resume

AFTER a long Liberation Day weekend, 10 women and two men will return to closed-door deliberations inside the courtroom of Superior Court of Guam Judge Anita Sukola to determine the fate of murder suspect Chad Ryan DeSoto.

DeSoto is facing three counts of aggravated murder for the deaths of three Japanese tourists and 11 counts of attempted murder for seriously wounding 11 others on the night of Feb. 12, 2013 in Tumon

The jury started its deliberations Friday weighing evidence and testimony to determine whether the 22-year-old defendant is innocent by reason of insanity

Jury instructions state "a person is not criminally responsible for conduct if at the time of such conduct, as a

result of mental illness, disease or defect, he lacked substantial capacity to know or understand what he was doing, or to know or understand that his conduct was wrongful, or to control his actions

The defense claimed that DeSoto falls under the three elements and should not be criminally responsible.

Under Guam law, conviction of murder has a maximum of a life sentence. However, if the defendant is acquitted because of mental illness or disease, the court may order an evaluation of his condition and may initiate further government action against him.

The trial that started July 15 is expected to end this week with the jury's verdict.



Guam Decolonization Registry still open

DURING the 70th Guam Liberation Day Parade, the Office of Sen. Ben Pangelinan opened its doors to the community just as it had in previous years to encourage eligible members of the community to sign up for the Guam Decolonization Registry

Lisa Dames, chief of staff, said the staff hopes to continue the initiative, for which the late senator had been strongly advocating over the past years.

This will be the last one that we will do for Liberation Day but we hope to continue the senator's work," she said, adding that the staff is committed to sustaining the initiative.

As of April, the Guam Election Commission reported that the list had grown to 6,569 names.

The registry was created by law 14 years ago.

With the passage of another piece of legislation introduced by former Sen. Judith Guthertz, now P.L. 31-244, a mechanism was created to expand the registration process by identifying more registrars. The law also tasks the Decolonization Commission with developing a plan of action and an education campaign.

Maria Pangelinan, executive director of the election commission, recently reported that prior to receiving funding for the registry in 2011, only 938 people had registered.

However, in August that same year, the commission received an additional 3,843 names from the Chamorro Land Trust.

According to the law, a lessee under the Chamorro Land Trust is listed automatically in the Guam Decolonization Registry.

Under Guam's plebiscite law, the self-determination exercise is restricted to "native inhabitants," defined as "those who became U.S. citizens by virtue of the 1950 Organic Act and their blood descendants."

The law sets a threshold of 70 percent of the eligible voters as a prerequisite for holding a plebiscite for self-determination.

PDS appeals termination of telecommunications contract

PACIFIC Data Systems Inc. (PDS) has filed an appeal with the Office of Public Accountability afterthe General Services Agency fired the company for a breach of contract.

According to documents filed with the OPA, PDS was awarded the bid to install telecommunication services to government agencies including the Guam Fire Department and the Department of Public Health and Social Services. During the delivery of those services. Teleguam Holdings LLC GTA filed a motion alleging contempt of court against PDS and GSA related to the services.

PDS wrote in its appeal that "it was decided by PDS and GSA that during the pendency of this motion, all work on the installation of the new voice services should be suspended."

The bid specified that the services be completed within 150 days after PDS received the purchase order.

The appellant, PDS, stated that on April 22, the company provided an update to GSA regarding the status of the installations for the voice services and requested GSA confirm a revised schedule of service installation. GSA had yet to reply to the request, the appellant wrote.

A month later, on May 30, GSA issued default notices to PDS regarding the telecommunications services and last month, on June 10, PDS was sent a termination memorandum. "The GSA memo stated that the PDS services were being terminated based on PDS's failure to timely deliver the voice services specified under these (purchase orders)," appeal documents said.

The next day, PDS requested that GSA reconsider the termination in a letter to the agency, including notification justifying its position that PDS had not failed to meet the deadline. Instead, PDS wrote that the deadline for delivery of the services had not lapsed because of previous excusable delays, including the motion filed by GTA regarding the services.

PDS wrote that the termination of the company's services by GSA was "invalid, without justification and an illegal act."

"The facts show that PDS was complying with the terms of the procurement related to the delivery of the voice services covered by these GSA purchase orders." documents state. "Rather than being late. PDS was actually ahead of the delivery timeline under the allowed procurement."

GSA acting Chief Procurement Officer Robert Kono sent a memo to the OPA in connection with the appeals filed by PDS on June 25. Kono wrote that an upfront hearing with the hearing office would be valuable in resolving the issue.

The OPA responded and a status hearing is scheduled for Wednesday, July 9 before the hearing office.

Class-action voting discrimination appeal to be heard

FOR the first time, the Unites States Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals will hear oral arguments on Guam in August and the historic event will be open to the public.

Chief Judge Frances
Tydingco-Gatewood, of the
District Court of Guam,
announced that on Aug. 27
at 10 a.m. the Ninth Circuit
judges will hear arguments on
one criminal and two civil cases
in the fourth-floor courtroom
of the District Court of Guam
courthouse.

According to the Tydingco-Gatewood, no hearings of the Court of Appeals have ever been conducted on Guam.

The proceeding will be streamed on the Internet for viewing by the public and media will be allowed to record. broadcast and take still photographs provided they will file an application beforehand.

The cases that will be heard

► Guam Industrial Services v. Zurich American Insurance Co. – Guam Industrial Services Inc. which does business as Guam Shipyard. is appealing the District Court's judgment in favor of Zurich American Insurance Co. and Starr Indemnity

and Liability Co. in Guam Shipyard's insurance coverage action arising from the sinking of a drydock owned. The shipyard case stemmed from sinking of its drydock on Jan. 2, 2011 at the height of a high surf advisory issued the National Weather

Service.
Tydingco-Gatewood had ruled in favor of the insurance companies after the court concluded

that Guam Shipyard breached the insurance policy by failing to get the drydock certified by the U.S. Navy. The company is trying to collect \$646,643 from its insurer.

According to the Ninth Circuit Court calendar, each side will be given 15 minutes to present their arguments during the proceedings.

The court, however, did not disclose which circuit judges will be coming to hear the historic court proceedings.
