## Gambling: To pay off vendor debt

Sen. Ben Pangelinan, who introduced what lawmakers call the "sunset amendment" to Bill 19 which eventually could end all gambling — tried to establish a \$18.8 million target for the hospi-

However, Sen. Rory Respicio said that figure will not be part of the final version of the bill his Committee on Rules sends to the governor.

The final version of Bill 19, passed yesterday, was the end re-sult of several days of heated debate over gambling and gaming machines

It started as a battle over Bill 20. by Sen. Dennis Rodriguez, which would have used taxes and fees from hundreds of controversial gaming machines to benefit the hospital. The attorney general has said those machines, although currently licensed by the government, are illegal gambling devices.

Bill 20's opponents last week scored a victory after Speaker Judith Won Pat agreed that Bill 20 wasn't germane - too different from its original version - and removed it from the session agenda

Bill 20 supporters responded by moving the key provisions of Bill 20 to Bill 19, which already was a gambling-related bill on the session agenda.

The shift prompted Won Pat to abruptly end session last Friday by calling a recess until July 1.

But lawmakers, mostly supporters of Bill 20 and the revised Bill 19, voted to resume session at 9 a.m. yesterday, despite the speaker's decision for a longer recess


Won Pat yesterday said she decided to preside over yesterday's session as a means of resolving the fractures in the Legislature.

With the backing of Sens. Rory Respicio, Tony Ada, Tina Muña-Barnes, Mike Limtiaco, Brant Mc-Creadie, Mike San Nicolas and Aline Yamashita, Rodriguez yesterday was able to move most of his Bill 20 into Sen. Chris Duenas' Bill

After several heated debates, Pangelinan was able to remove a portion of the new Bill 19 that the attorney general had said could legalize the controversial gaming machines

The decision to eventually end all gaming on Guam started as an amendment by Pangelinan, who wanted the controversial gaming machines to stop operating and be stripped of their licenses as soon as the hospital's debt was paid.

San Nicolas took it a step further, introducing a successful

Pangelinan said a section of the bill effectively legalizes gaming machines. Rodriguez denied the section would have that effect, and angrily agreed to strike out that section.



amendment that would end all gaming and limited gaming activity on island when the hospital's vendor debts are paid.

Bill 19 also requires the appointment of a Guam Gaming Commis-sion, which would have 180 days to develop rules and regulations for all gaming activities on Guam. Gov. Eddie Calvo has 10 days



not including Sundays and holidays - from the time he receives a bill to act on it.

Lawmakers yesterday approved 20 other bills, including a bill that would establish a home invasion felony offense in Guam's criminal statute and another bill which would institute a "three strikes" life sentence for violent criminal offenders.

Henry Taitano, Jr. also was confirmed as director of the Guam Economic Development Authority on an 11-3-1 vote. His nomination had been defeated earlier this year, but he was renominated.

Vice Speaker Benjamin Cruz, Pangelinan and San Nicolas voted against confirming Taitano.

Sen. Frank Aguon left session after voting on bills and resolutions, but before lawmakers voted on confirmations.

Override attempts for two bills Calvo vetoed earlier in the year Bills 9 and 64 - failed.







## Plebiscite trial set for April 20

A trial for a lawsuit about the constitutionality of Guam's proposed Chamorro-only plebiscite has been set for April 2013

District Court of Guam Judge Joaquin Manibusan set a bench trial date for April 22, 2013, yesterday in a conference with lawyers.

The lawsuit was brought by Arnold Davis, a non-Chamorro resident who was barred from joining a registry of native inhabitants.

Davis, who has lived on Guam since 1977, sued the Guam Election Commission in November, saving that the lawsuit is meant to affirm the right of every U.S. citizen on Guam to vote on the decolonization issue

Guam law states that voters in a plebiscite will be allowed to voice their choice of one of three political status options - statehood, independence or free association with the United States. Eligible voters are those who can trace their roots back to residents living on the island

at the time of the passage of the Organic Act in 1950 who were made citizens by the federal law.

#### Motion to dismiss

Davis argues that the Chamorroonly vote is unconstitutional. But the Office of the Attorney General of Guam has filed a motion to dismiss Davis' suit, arguing the plebiscite will not have the effect,

immediate or otherwise, of actually altering Guam's future political status with the United States

The Center for Individual Rights, a nonprofit and civil rights advocate group based in Washington, D.C., and the Election Law Center in Alexandria, Va., are representing Davis in the case. Davis' counsel has filed a motion opposing the motion to dismiss, said Mun Su Park, a local lawyer working on Davis' behalf.

Local officials have said they hope to hold the plebiscite in 2014.

### Decolonization education debated

A member of the Governor's Commission for Decolonization expressed concern yesterday that promoting discussion in high schools about the proposed plebiscite might derail the commission's intention to hold a Chamorro-only vote.

Joe Garrido, chair of the commission's task force on free association, was skeptical of a Guam Legislature high school intern's suggestion to educate the youth on political status options by rallying high school students.

Holding discussions in high schools could create a "potential situation" in which students ineligible to vote may become upset and force the commission to hold a more inclusive plebiscite, he said.

Speaker Judith Won Pat said it was important to educate everyone on the matter, so ineligible voters would understand why they are excluded.

#### Legal challenge

Yesterday's meeting of the decolonization committee comes amid a legal challenge to the proposed plebiscite, which claims that limiting the vote to "native inhabitants" is unconstitutional. The Office of the Attorney General of Guam is working to have the lawsuit dismissed, arguing the plebiscite will not have the effect, immediate or oth-

erwise, of actually altering the island's future political status with

the United States, according to Pacific Daily News files.

Peter Jang, a senior at St. John's School and an intern at Won Pat's office, is coordinator of the "I Decide ..." forum, an event tentatively scheduled for March that will "include our youth in the academic discourse." Jang, who is not a native inhabitant under plebiscite rules, is ineligible to vote — a fact pointed out by Garrido after Jang's explanation of his plan to educate students. Jang said he is aware.

At yesterday's meeting the decolonization committee recommended setting the date of the plebiscite to November 2014, during the general election. The date is conditional on whether the registry of Chamorro voters is complete, and how successful an education campaign has been, said Edward Alvarez, executive director of the decolonization commission.

Alvarez has already started the work of educat-

work of educating the population, including the youth. He

said he's reached out to high school students and veterans, and is working on formulating a broader education plan. The right of native inhabitants to vote is provided for in an agreement between the United States and the United Nations, and the plebiscite is not meant to be offensive to the ineligible population, he said.

The lawsuit, which was filed in November 2011, has had no effect on the commission's work, he said.

# \$280,000 waits to be paid as child support

About \$280,000 in overdue tax refund payments is in limbo at the Office of the Attorney General because contact information for parents is out of date.

The office issued a press release yesterday urging custodial parents

to provide the Child Support Enforcement Division with their latest addresses

and phone numbers as soon as possible.

"So much money is just sitting

there waiting to reach a child in need," Attorney General Leonardo Rapadas said in a press release.

"For them not to have it because there is no address to send the check to should not be an excuse. Let's work together to ensure our children get what they deserve and need."

#### \$2.8 million

In total, the AG's office collected about \$2.8 million in garnished tax refunds in December, when

GovGuam paid out about \$200 million in refunds to local residents.

About 3,000 non-custodial parents, who owed an average of

\$17,000 each in child support, didn't get their tax refund checks.

Of the \$2.8 million, about \$1 million has been paid out, the press release said. The rest is on hold because either the AG's office is still

GuamPDN reviewing thirdparty claims, or the claims are under review as part of another public

welfare program, the press release states.
