Statham echoes Justice Kennedy's opinion in Rice v. Cateyano that "ancestry can be a proxy for race." The law (i.e. procedure) cannot be used as a tool that undermines the very principles upon which it is founded.

Statham offers the practical solution for full inclusion (two plebiscites) that links theory to practice without undermining democratic principles.

Besides family, only two institutions have consistently secured the traditions of the Chamorro people and promote the development of our community, the Church and the university.

While the Church continues to break the barriers of irreconcilable differences and foster the understanding of community, the University of Guam, conversely, has been suspect to its means and ends.

UOG remains politically vulnerable to the appetites of destruction that Michael San Nicolas promotes. San Nicolas promotes the crisis of legitimacy.

Hitler, Pol-Pot, and Stalin have echoed San Nicolas' words. The late Anthony Quan reminded his students to recognize these fallacies of reasoning, without engaging in repetition. His words resonate now more than ever.
