

Chamorro Land Trust bypassed applicants

As a public service, the Pacific Daily News every Wednesday will publish a list of 100 names of those who were skipped in the processing of Chamorro Land Trust applications for agricultural or residential land leases.

About 3,000 applicants were skipped since 1995.

The following applicants were bypassed by the Chamorro Land Trust Commission and should have been processed.

A weekly list of 100 bypassed applicants will be published on Page 3 on Wednesday and will continue until the bypassed applications are brought current. The names are published in alphabetical order.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

▲ If your name or your relative's name is printed in the weekly 100, please visit the Chamorro Land Trust Commission office in Anigua on Saturday.

▲ The Commission will be open from 8 a.m. to noon every Saturday. Only those 100 bypassed applicants will be processed on Saturdays.

▲ If you were born after April 11, 1899, and before August 1, 1950, please bring your birth certificate. If you were born after August 1, 1950, please bring your birth certificate and your Chamorro parent's birth certificate.

- 1. Column: Last Name** — The last name of the applicant.
- 2. Column: Full Name** — The complete name of the applicant(s) as it appears on the application.

intellect so you can help solve our most difficult problems. If you don't do that — if you quit on school — you're not just quitting on yourself, you're quitting on your country.

Now I know it's not always easy to do well in school. I know a lot of you have challenges in your lives right now that can make it hard to focus on your schoolwork.

I get it. I know what that's like. My father left my family when I was 2 years old, and I was raised by a single mother who struggled at times to pay the bills and wasn't always able to give us things the other kids had. There were times when I missed having a father in my life. There were times when I was lonely and felt like I didn't fit in.

So I wasn't always as focused as I should have been. I did some things I'm not proud of, and got in more trouble than I should have.

And my life could have easily taken a turn for the worse.

But I was fortunate. I got a lot of second chances and had the opportunity to go to college, and law school, and follow my dreams. My wife, our first lady Michelle Obama, has a similar story. Neither of her parents had gone to college, and they didn't have much. But they worked hard, and she worked hard, so that she could go to the best schools in this country.

... But at the end of the day, the circumstances of your life — what you look like, where you come from, how much money you have, what you've got going on at home — that's no excuse for neglecting your homework or having a bad attitude. That's no excuse for talking back to your teacher, or cutting class, or dropping out of school. That's no excuse for not trying.

Where you are right now doesn't have to determine where you'll end up. No one's written your destiny for you. Here in America, you write your own destiny. You make your own future.

That's what young people like you are doing every day, all across America.

Set goals

... That's why, today, I'm calling on each of you to set your own goals for your ed-

ucation — and to do everything you can to meet them.

... Whatever you resolve to do, I want you to commit to it. I want you to really work at it.

... The truth is, being successful is hard. You won't love every subject you study. You won't click with every teacher. Not every homework assignment will seem completely relevant to your life right this minute. And you won't necessarily succeed at everything the first time you try.

That's OK. Some of the most successful people in the world are the ones who've had the most failures. J.K. Rowling's first Harry Potter book was rejected 12 times before it was finally published. Michael Jordan was cut from his high school basketball team, and he lost hundreds of games and missed thousands of shots during his career. But he once said, "I have failed over and over and over again in my life. And that is why I succeed."

... No one's born being good at things, you become good at things through hard work. You're not a varsity athlete the first time you play a new sport. You don't hit every note the first time you sing a song. You've got to practice. It's the same with your schoolwork. You might have to do a math problem a few times before you get it right, or read something a few times before you understand it, or do a few drafts of a paper before it's good enough to hand in.

Don't be afraid to ask questions. Don't be afraid to ask for help when you need it. I do that every day. Asking for help isn't a sign of weakness, it's a sign of strength. It shows you have the courage to admit when you don't know something, and to learn something new. So find an adult you trust — a parent, grandparent or teacher, a coach or counselor — and ask them to help you stay on track to meet your goals.

And even when you're struggling, even when you're discouraged, and you feel like other people have given up on you — don't ever give up on yourself. Because when you give up on yourself, you give up on your country.

Hearing dates set in JFK rebuilding

The first of many procurement appeal hearings over the construction of John F. Kennedy High School was held yesterday.

Dates were set for the Guam Community Improvement Foundation to argue their appeal. The Foundation has protested a contract to rebuild the dilapidated school, which was awarded to International Bridge Corp. The protest halted a groundbreaking that was scheduled for Aug. 7.

JFK High School students and faculty filled the hearing room in the DNA Building during yesterday's status and scheduling conference.

A hearing to determine whether there is "substantial interest" in allowing the construction to move forward while the appeal is being resolved is set for Sept. 28. A preconference hearing is scheduled for Sept. 30.

Normally, when a protest or appeal is filed, all construction must stop. But Public Auditor Doris Flores Brooks can decide whether it's in the "substantial interest" of the community to allow the construction to move forward while the protest is being resolved.

The Department of Public Works rejected the Foundation's protest early last

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month, starting the appeals process with the Office of Public Accountability.

During attempts to schedule dates for the upcoming hearings, Assistant Attorney General Benjamin Abrams, representing Public Works, raised concerns over what he called delays by the Foundation.

He said his office is ready to argue the case, but attorney Jeffrey Cook, sitting in for attorney F. Randall Cunliffe, told hearing officer attorney Anthony Camacho that he couldn't immediately agree with an expedited hearing scheduled since he wasn't the lead attorney for the appeal.

Tony Sgro of the Guam Community Improvement Foundation said, "We have no intention of delaying. ... We just want a level playing field, that's all."

The Foundation filed its protest, arguing that International Bridge Corp. failed to meet the financing requirements, or that the government changed those requirements during the bid process.

Hearing dates set in JFK rebuilding

▲ A hearing to determine whether there is "substantial interest" in allowing the construction of John F. Kennedy High School to move forward while the appeal is being resolved is set for Sept. 28. A preconference hearing is scheduled for Sept. 30.

The first of many procurement appeal hearings over the construction of John F. Kennedy High School was held yesterday.

Dates were set for the Guam Community Improvement Foundation to argue their appeal. The Foundation has protested a contract to rebuild the dilapidated school, which was awarded to International Bridge Corp. The protest halted a groundbreaking that was scheduled for Aug. 7.

JFK High School students and faculty filed the hearing room in the DNA Building during yesterday's status and scheduling conference.

A hearing to determine whether there is "substantial interest" in allowing the construction to move forward while the appeal is being resolved is set for Sept. 28. A preconference hearing is scheduled for Sept. 30.

Normally, when a protest or appeal is filed, all construction must stop. But Public Auditor Doris Flores Brooks can decide whether it's in the "substantial interest" of the community to allow the construction to move forward while the protest is being resolved.

The Department of Public Works rejected the Foundation's protest early last

month, starting the appeals process with the Office of Public Accountability.

During attempts to schedule dates for the upcoming hearings, Assistant Attorney General Benjamin Abrams, representing Public Works, raised concerns over what he called delays by the Foundation.

He said his office is ready to argue the case, but attorney Jeffrey Cook, sitting in for attorney F. Randall Cunliffe, told hearing officer attorney Anthony Camacho that he couldn't immediately agree with an expedited hearing scheduled since he wasn't the lead attorney for the appeal.

Tony Sgro of the Guam Community Improvement Foundation said, "We have no intention of delaying. ... We just want a level playing field, that's all."

The Foundation filed its protest, arguing that International Bridge Corp. failed to meet the financing requirements, or that the government changed those requirements during the bid process.

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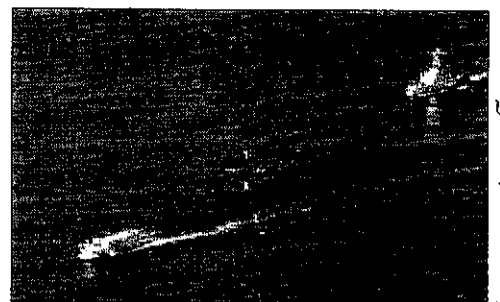

Coast Guard seizes Taiwan fishing vessel

The U.S. Coast Guard seized a Taiwanese-flagged fishing vessel and escorted it into the port in Saipan over the weekend for suspected fisheries violations within the boundaries of the U.S. Exclusive Economic Zone, the Coast Guard announced.

The crew of the 22-meter, 56-ton Te Hung Fa is alleged to have been illegally fishing for sharks, tuna and other types of fish with its long line gear deployed well within the U.S. EEZ, according to the Coast Guard.

The fishing vessel was intercepted in waters surrounding the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, approximately 400 miles north-northwest of Guam. The Te Hung Fa was met by officers of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Office of Law Enforcement for investigation into alleged violations

of the Magnuson-Stevens Fisheries Conservation and Management Act.

The crew of a C-130 aircraft from the Coast Guard Air Station in Honolulu documented the alleged violations.

The crew of the Guam-based Coast Guard Cutter Washington intercepted the fishing vessel 17 nautical miles within the U.S. EEZ on

Aug. 27. "Essentially, the fishing vessel is alleged to have stayed within

the U.S. EEZ for some time - long enough for us to document from the air and to have a surface boarding team on scene in time to make the seizure," said Lt. Cmdr. Jay Caputo, fisheries enforcement officer with the 14th Coast Guard District in Honolulu.

Federal authorities plan to pursue a case against the owners of the Te Hung Fa. The Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act authorizes the imposition of civil penalties up to \$140,000 per violation and full forfeiture of the vessel and its catch.

intellect so you can help solve our most difficult problems. If you don't do that — if you quit on school — you're not just quitting on yourself, you're quitting on your country.

Now I know it's not always easy to do well in school. I know a lot of you have challenges in your lives right now that can make it hard to focus on your schoolwork.

I get it. I know what that's like. My father left my family when I was 2 years old, and I was raised by a single mother who struggled at times to pay the bills and wasn't always able to give us things the other kids had. There were times when I missed having a father in my life. There were times when I was lonely and felt like I didn't fit in.

So I wasn't always as focused as I should have been. I did some things I'm not proud of, and got in more trouble than I should have. And my life could have easily taken a turn for the worse.

But I was fortunate. I got a lot of second chances and had the opportunity to go to college, and law school, and follow my dreams. My wife, our first lady Michelle Obama, has a similar story. Neither of her parents had gone to college, and they didn't have much. But they worked hard, and she worked hard, so that she could go to the best schools in this country.

... But at the end of the day, the circumstances of your life — what you look like, where you come from, how much money you have, what you've got going on at home — that's no excuse for neglecting your homework or having a bad attitude. That's no excuse for talking back to your teacher, or cutting class, or dropping out of school. That's no excuse for not trying.

Where you are right now doesn't have to determine where you'll end up. No one's written your destiny for you. Here in America, you write your own destiny. You make your own future.

That's what young people like you are doing every day, all across America.

Set goals

... That's why, today, I'm calling on each of you to set your own goals for your ed-

ucation — and to do everything you can to meet them.

... Whatever you resolve to do, I want you to commit to it. I want you to really work at it.

... The truth is, being successful is hard. You won't love every subject you study. You won't click with every teacher. Not every homework assignment will seem completely relevant to your life right this minute. And you won't necessarily succeed at everything the first time you try.

That's OK. Some of the most successful people in the world are the ones who've had the most failures. J.K. Rowling's first Harry Potter book was rejected 12 times before it was finally published. Michael Jordan was cut from his high school basketball team, and he lost hundreds of games and missed thousands of shots during his career. But he once said, "I have failed over and over and over again in my life. And that is why I succeed."

... No one's born being good at things, you become good at things through hard work. You're not a varsity athlete the first time you play a new sport. You don't hit every note the first time you sing a song. You've got to practice. It's the same with your schoolwork. You might have to do a math problem a few times before you get it right, or read something a few times before you understand it, or do a few drafts of a paper before it's good enough to hand in.

Don't be afraid to ask questions. Don't be afraid to ask for help when you need it. I do that every day. Asking for help isn't a sign of weakness, it's a sign of strength. It shows you have the courage to admit when you don't know something, and to learn something new. So find an adult you trust — a parent, grandparent or teacher; a coach or counselor — and ask them to help you stay on track to meet your goals.

And even when you're struggling, even when you're discouraged, and you feel like other people have given up on you — don't ever give up on yourself. Because when you give up on yourself, you give up on your country.

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GFD wants to increase ambulance fees

The Guam Fire Department has collected about \$100,000 from new ambulance fees in recent months, which shows that a new billing system is working, but those prices need to be increased.

That is according to Fire Chief Joey San Nicolas, who said yesterday that he was pleased with new fee system, but felt it still needed tweaking.

The current Emergency Patient Transport Fee of \$195 is probably the lowest in the nation, and needs to at least double to match national standards, San Nicolas said. Regardless, the current fee is still better than no fee at all, he said.

"Even \$10 is better than zero

dollars," San Nicolas said. "It's a good start for the fire department. It's \$100,000 we didn't have prior, ... and it just shows that we should have started this a long time ago."

After years of discussion, the

fire department enacted a set of ambulance fees about three months ago, according to Pacific Daily News files. The department was allowed to back bill for three more months, and all together this has amounted to \$100,000, San Nicolas said. That is a monthly average of about \$16,500, but the fire chief said it is still too soon to assume this will be the average collection amount.

However much money is collected, the funds go into the Department's Flame account, which is spent on equipment and training for firefighters. The account has been collecting money for years, but none of the funds captured through ambulance fees have been spent yet, San Nicolas said.

"We know exactly how we want to spend it, and it's actually out-

lined in the law how to spend it," San Nicolas said. "The issue is that it is still subject to appropriation in the Legislature. ... You can bring in \$100,000, but with the Legislature, you are still subject to their authority."

Determining the fee

The fire department has included the funding in its budget proposal for fiscal 2013. The proposal is pending before the Legislature.

But fire department officials are researching how much they believe the Emergency Patient Transport Fee should be increased, the fire chief said.

The recommended increase most likely would be based on Medicare reimbursement levels for Guam, which are at least \$400 per ambulance trip, San Nicolas said. In some

richer parts of the country, the same fee is about \$800 or even \$1,200, San Nicolas said.

The fire department has yet to nail down a hard number for its recommended increase, said agency spokesman Lt. Ed Artero. Any increase of the fee will have to be approved by the Legislature, Artero said.

Artero said the department is not planning to raise fees for other ambulance services such as scheduled transport and standby services.

A company named Life Quest coordinates the ambulance fee collection. Currently, LifeQuest gets paid 24 percent of the ambulance fees collected, but the company's share of the collections will decrease if the fees are increased, Artero said.

Families get back Radio Barrigada ancestral land

The families will get back several acres of land near Radio Barrigada.

Parts of the holdings of the late Joaquin Mendiola and Vicente Santos were given back to the families during a Guam Ancestral Lands Commission deed-signing ceremony yesterday at Adelup. The commission is in charge of returning land deemed excess by the federal government to its ancestral owners, according to Pacific Daily News files.

Gov. Eddie Calvo said he was glad to give back the lands to their rightful owners.

"We're giving back these proper-



ties to the rightful owners and it's only right to do so," Calvo said.

The families gathered around the table as a family representative

signed the deed for the land.

Rosario Anderson, great-granddaughter of Santos, held back tears after she signed the deed. She said

her family was appreciative of getting the land back.

"We are so thankful to all of you who helped us," Anderson said.

David Baza, Santos' grandson, said this day was a long time coming.

"This is the day we've been waiting for," Baza said.

Daniel Mendiola, Joaquin Mendiola's grandson, who signed the deed for his family, said the people

of Guam long deserved getting their land back.

"Our family gives a heartfelt appreciation for returning the property back to us," Mendiola said, adding that he didn't think getting the land back would happen while he was alive. His parents and grandparents have since died, never having had the chance to return to their land.

"I'm happy. Now we can get our family members up and going by giving them property and having them settle down," Daniel Mendiola said.

He said some members of his family don't have land and are living in apartments, so it'd be nice to give them land so they can have something of their own.

"They can get their foot on the ground and just have something they can call their own," Mendiola said.

Museum construction awaits Legislative approval

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The Guam Museum will become a reality as soon as the Guam Legislature votes on a bill to move forward with the construction.

Bill 454-31, written by Vice Speaker Benjamin Cruz, would transfer control of Skinner Plaza from the Legislature to the government of Guam to construct the museum. After the bill is approved by the Legislature, construction can begin on the property, according to Guam Museum Foundation chairman Monte Mesa.

The foundation is a nonprofit organization that helps find funds for

the museum and is working closely to help build it.

Mesa said the foundation has drafts for designs of the museum and is waiting to be able to survey the land. Mesa said the foundation won't be able to move forward until the transfer is final.

A public hearing for the bill was held Monday and several government agencies sent letters of support for the transfer. Joseph Cameron, president of the Department of Chamorro Affairs, said his department is in full support of the bill.

Cameron said he was in support of building the museum since it would help build the Hagåtña area as a museum district. Other histor-

ical sites can be visited from the museum site, including the Plaza de España and Angel Santos Latte Stone Park.

The Guam Economic Development Authority sent a letter of support as well. Karl Pangelinan, GEDA administrator, stated the project would instill pride in the capital city and reinforce cultural branding for visitors to the island.

Monte Marinas, director of Department of Land Management, stated he was in full support of the transfer and felt it would develop a highly competitive tourism product.

Other sites

Sen. Ben Pangelinan, chairman of the committee on land, said he

liked the former site of Fort Apugan in Agaña Heights because it would have a stronger impact.

"The site would overlook Hagåtña Bay and the city would, for me, be more impactful," said Pangelinan, who is running for reelection.

He said building the museum at Skinner Plaza would decrease green space in downtown Hagåtña and would increase congestion in the area.

Mesa said the foundation has heard these concerns and have addressed them.

He said the main reason for the move to Skinner Plaza was that construction at Fort Apugan would be too expensive and would take longer

to construct than allowed. The \$27-million bond money for the project needs to be spent by 2014, Mesa said.

If the bill is passed, construction can begin by January 2013 and be finished by December 2014.

Concerns over green space are mitigated since the museum will not take the whole area of Skinner Plaza and would be several stories, Mesa said. The plan for the museum would include three levels and a mezzanine area. The museum would start near the Dulce Nombre de Maria Cathedral-Basilica and go no farther than the amphitheater in Skinner Plaza. The amphitheater will be renovated to have outside shows, he said.

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
